World Central Kitchen

WCK is first to the frontlines, providing fresh meals in response to humanitarian, climate, and community crises. In 2010, Chef José Andrés, ready to use his culinary knowledge and talent to help, headed to Haiti following a devastating earthquake. Cooking alongside displaced families in a camp, he was guided on the proper way to cook black beans the way Haitians like to eat them: mashed and sieved into a creamy sauce. It wasn't just about feeding people in need—it was about listening, learning, and cooking side by side with the people impacted by the crisis. This is the real meaning of comfort food, and it's the core value that José, along with his wife Patricia, used at the center of founding World Central Kitchen.

I am a 29 year-old software engineer living in Oakland. I joined the First Unitarian Church of Oakland as a new UU a year ago. Moving to Oakland and broadening my spiritual horizon has had me rethink what I want in wonderful and challenging ways. I hope to share some of that with everyone in my part of the service.

Gillian Fynn (she/her)

Gillian has been an Activist for Peace and Justice all her adult life. Growing up in Africa she was exposed early to the struggle for liberation. In the 1970's, she and her family experienced civil war against the Dictator Somoza in Nicaragua. While living in Ohio, Gillian returned with Witness for PEACE, to resist Contra attacks on Nicaraguans by staying in the war zone as a buffer. She cofounded The Wayne County Peace Coalition fighting for a Nuclear Freeze and Sanctuary for displaced refugees from Central America. Currently Gillian is active in Indivisible East Bay, plus Friends of La Peña Immigration Rights.

Annice Jacoby (she/her)

Annice Jacoby is recognized for her innovative work in public art, literature and visual arts. Highlights include Street Art San Francisco: Mission Muralismo (Abrams) & Fort Point Project, opening performance at the Hague Appeal for Peace. Annice Jacoby expands art in public life with poetry, theater and media to spark ideas and institutions to examine the critical issues of the day. www.annicejacoby.com

Rev. Dr. Bonnie Dlott (she/her)

Since retiring after 11 years of ministry with the Napa congregation, Rev. Bonnie Dlott had the privilege of serving the UU congregations in Santa Rosa and Petaluma as a contract minister. Rev. Bonnie is a Bay Area native and spends her time communing with nature, cooking, traveling, and playing with her two grand babies.

Social Justice Watch

This column is dedicated to longtime BFUU/SJC member, Ann Fagan Ginger, an expert on international law, the United Nations, and human rights. She transitioned on Aug 20 at age 100. Longterm BFUU friend, Esteban, recounted that, according to her caregiver, that morning "Ann expressed the wish to 'be with Richard,' extended her arms outward in an actual, metaphysical embrace, and easily, peacefully exited." Ann and author Richard Challacombe met and fell in love at BFUU. Ann founded the Meiklejohn Civil Liberties Institute, which also houses the archives of the National Lawyers Guild. There may be a memorial at BFUU on Dec. 10, Human Rights Day. Obit coming soon.

Could Ann have planted this seed? Francesca Albanese, the UN Special Rapporteur for Palestine, <u>called on the nations of the world</u> to send their navies to break the Gaza blockade. "Deliberate attacks on health and care workers, and health facilities, which are gross violations of international humanitarian law, must stop now. There is a moral imperative for the international community to end the carnage and allow the people of Gaza to live on their land..."

We continue standing up to the genocide. As well as recurring events listed below, on Aug 12, we rallied and marched from Union Sq. On Aug 23, Palestinians brought handcrafts, embroidered clothing, and food to sell in our Hall. "Seeds of Resistance" was an inspiring fundraiser with a film screening as well, and a full house.

Stop Billionaires, End Fossil Fuels, and Extinction Rebellion held a riveting Panel Discussion to another full house in our Hall on Aug 17. Phoebe was arrested with them the next day at Black Rock, the final stop on a Corporate Tour of Shame. See photos on page 6.

Karen Hao's Empire of AI is well researched: By 2030 data centers may use more energy than all of India via nukes/coal. By 2027 artificial Intelligence could use half the amount of fresh water that the UK uses. Just one of Microsoft's projects near Phoenix is about the size of 650 football fields. There's huge resistance in the Global South, with mega data centers planned in drought-striken areas. Kenyans' labor exploited! US artists' and writers' work stolen towards making their work obsolete! Massive job losses due to automation! Bigotry and inaccuracies in search results. AI sometimes lies and blackmails, has caused suicides. It's rushed, sloppy, out of control. So development of AGI and ASI (General and Super, meaning smarter than humans) must be stopped until if/when it is safe. "Mitigating the risk of extinction from AI should be a global priority."— Statement on AI Risk, signed by hundreds of experts including top AI companies and scientists. Marjorie, Betsy, Margaret, Hank, Mike, more sang for justice & peace on University Ave. On Aug 16 we protested at multiple locations for Voting Rights-nationwide actions. On Aug 17, Phoebe and Gillian helped banner against fascism on Berkeley's pedestrian bridge.






